ENGAGE : A FORUM

CSA faculty members Archt. Sadev Wittachy and Archt. Dimantha Weliange attended the 2nd Architectural Educator Forum at the Department of Architecture School of Design & Environment of the National University of Singapore on the 5th August 2016. Themed: "ENGAGE" It examined ideas in which real-life issues and learning opportunities are created from the collaboration between educators and parties outside the academia and across disciplines; As well as the importance of moving towards a more hands-on, collaborative and inter-disciplinary mode of education thereby bridging the escalating gap between design and construction, academia and practice, and architectural discourse and the social realm.

FROM PUNE WITH LOVE

CSA welcomed a group of 17 students and 2 faculty members from the Indira College of Architecture and Design in Pune, Maharashtra, India. They visited CSA on the 11th of November 2016 as a part of an academic activity-based exposure to international architecture. The winners of the 2016 RIBA President's Medal were announced at a ceremony at the Royal Institute of British Architects in central London on the 6th of December. First awarded in 1836, the President's Medal rewards talent, promotes innovation, and encourages excellence in the field of architecture worldwide. This year 275 entries were received from 87 schools in 33 countries including Sri Lanka.


Our own Roven Rebeira was awarded a commendation in the silver medal category for his design for the "Center for Ethno-Elephantology: A cross-species design initiative". Roven, who received tutoring at CSA, is the first student from South Asia to receive a commendation for this award.

The Head of Education Projects of the RIBA, Johm-Paul Nunes sent his congratulations on this outstanding achievement, marking Roven's design as one of the best out of 275 entries and one of the only 3 entries which received commendations in the silver medal category.

RIBA also accredits the design tutors who guided the winning students. Final Year tutors Archts. Tamara Wijayapala and Samanthika Piyasena also accompanied Roven to this Occasion.

The inaugural celebration included a number of stalls, student exhibitions and guest lectures which were attended by students, alumni and curious visitors alike. The event also marked the unveiling of the CSA 30th Anniversary publication as well as the first edition of the annual newsletter.

Each speaker elaborated on different topics of architectural significance, ranging from in-depth analyses of the relationship between Modernist art and design, detailed descriptions of personal projects and outlooks into the changing state of Geoffery Bawa's designs.

The events wound down with a slow set of tunes performed by musical duo Lasith and Rushinee, and signaled the finale of the inaugural 30th Year celebratory Design Festival. Will there be more to come? Fingers crossed in anticipation of the next 30 years!





































'86 TO '16: A REVIEW

The lecture by Archt. Madhura Prematilleke, addressing the perception of sustainability and versatility, worked to demonstrate its relevance through a series of projects.

He spoke of the use of material that would typically be referred to as 'waste material', as architectural elements in his designs. His use of irregular pieces of glass could still be used as panels for doors and windows, whilst maintaining an aesthetically pleasing ambiance, is an ode to this.

In his design of the Jaffna Cultural Center, we grasp the notions of sustainability in all three of its dimensions. Though still unbuilt, the cultural center design includes an auditorium, cultural museum and a learning spire- essentially a net zero energy building. However, the space first gives prominence to a public square. He stated that the "public square is more important than the building that surrounds it". Therefore, the building is set to attract the casual pedestrian, thus hosting culture both in its formal and informal state.

Archt. Prematilleke also elaborated on the rights that people have over architecture. Ranging from, the right to fresh air and dignity to the right to hope and joy, this comprehensive lecture informed us of the responsibility of the Designer to the greater public.

Prof. Jagath Weerasinghe's address to the audience at the CSA Design festival was a collection of concepts on the confrontation of ideas, his practice and his personal belief culminating In the topic of 'what is good art' or 'how to buy good art'.

The understanding of what is good and bad tests the morality, standards, taste and ultimately what a person may stand for. The idea of good and bad generally influences the core values of a person's beliefs and these in turn are also affected by their surrounding culture, background and traditions in which they are steeped in. The talk opened a forum for the discussion of the representation of people, both artistically and architecturally.
